
1. Violence against physicians





Work-related violence

- Any incident in which a person is abused, threatened or assaulted in circumstances relating to their work.
- This can include verbal abuse or threats as well as physical attacks.
- The number of unwanted events toward healthcare personnel doubled from 2013 to 2015.*











Have you suffered workplace violence?






What kind of violent incident have you expirienced?






Have you reported the incident to the authorities?






Who were the perpetrators of physical and non-physical violence?






Are physical protection and security at the appropriate level in health care institutions?


- CMC suggested changes of the Criminal act to the Minister of justice:

3. Licensing & Continued Medical Education





Croatian Medical chamber

- Competent authority
- Validates all forms of CME events

Revalidation process

- All medical doctors practicing medicine have to follow different types of continuous medical education (symposia, meetings etc.)
- Collect credits appointed by the Croatian Medical Chamber (CMC)



Requirements necessary to renew the license:

120 credits/ 6 years



- EU funded project
- Developed by Croatian Medical Chamber



Investing in people European Social Fund



- Educational workshops for 2000 family doctors
- 4 000 000 €



4. Treatment protocols&Guidelines





Civil Obligations Act (Article 10, paragraph 2)

- In fulfillment of the professional obligations participants in mandatory relations (doctors i.e.) are obliged to act in accordance with the rules of profession and good practice.
- Guidelines are not lawfully binding
- Can be used as reference by court experts



- Croatian Medical Association umbrella organisation for different medical speciality societies
- National collection of medical guidelines 2004-2014
- 60 different guidelines/ 19 professional societies
- Usually enthusiast doctors in their spare time
- No systemic approach existed till last year



- 2016. Croatian medical association started the cooperation with NICE (National Institute for Health and Care Excellence)
- With support of Ministry of health
- Short, clear, applicable guidelines and algorithms for diagnosing and treating the most common diseases
- Still waiting for the results



• No national standards and norms for physicians

- Demanded by professional community
- Extra burdened physicians



• Croatian Medical Union was assigned to draft by the Ministry of health one year ago
